A Social Guide

We can read this story as we get ready for our trip to Redcliffe Museum. In this story we will learn about what we can find inside the museum and about some of the people who work there and can help with our visit.

Redcliffe Museum celebrates the story of the Redcliffe Peninsula. Inside we will find lots of objects that relate to the history of the area, some of which are very old! There are also photographs and movies to watch. Around the museum we will find lots of places to sit and relax too.

THE ENTRY

At the front of the museum there is a ramp and a walkway to the sliding door entry.

Inside, we will see friendly staff who wear black uniforms. They will say hello and welcome you to the museum. They will tell us about what is on in the museum and help with any questions we may have.



There is also a counter with information brochures about upcoming events in the museum and around the Moreton Bay region. We are welcome to take home any that interest us.

TEMPORARY EXHIBITION SPACE




Along the left wall in the museum, near the entrance to the museum, we will find sliding glass doors that lead us into the exhibition space.

This area gets changed every three to four months. So next time we come back, we might see something different. It is a large, quiet space with interesting objects and stories to learn about.

Sometimes there will be videos or activities we can do there.

FIRST PEOPLE




On the orange and white wall opposite the exhibition space, we will find a display on the culture of First People.

There is a seat directly under a white sound dome. When we go under the sound dome we can hear the words and sounds for the film that is playing. It is a short documentary interviewing local First Nations people on the Gubbi Gubbi language and culture.

At the right end of the wall there is a small box of pisolites, which are magnetic rocks that were collected from the Redcliffe foreshore. We can use the magnet to play with them, and drag the small rocks around the box.

IMAGINARIUM



The Imaginarium is a fun, creative, learning space.

It has a table in the centre with art and crafts for everyone.

Sometimes we can make a craft that we add to the group space and other times we take home what we create. The choice is ours.

It can be a little bit noisy and crowded when children, families or school groups are busy creating and learning together. The Imaginarium changes every three to four months, so next time you come there might be something new to try!

REDCLIFFE STORIES



We will find a section called Holidays by the Seaside at the back of the museum. This area has blue walls and is about Redcliffe as a place to go for holidays. Here we learn about how people came to Redcliffe, where they stayed and what they did for fun.

There is a raised walkway here made of timber, which is from the original Redcliffe jetty. This can feel bumpy under our feet, but it is very safe.

There are three screens playing different slideshows in this area that we can watch. None of them have any sound.

The largest screen on the back wall is a slideshow of photos by Redcliffe photographer George Mewes.

SCENES OF LIFE



The Shed has a lot of old things that parents, grandparents and greatgrandparents would have used in their homes when they were young.

When you enter the shed, a voice recording will welcome you. The voice will also talk when we touch certain things to tell us the story of the object.

We can smell the timber and hear a creaking, wooden floor. The different rooms are for looking at the objects and how they were used. Many of the items were given to the museum by people who lived in Redcliffe.

THE THEATRE



The Theatre is a dark room, with rows of seating for people to watch short films about Redcliffe.

When we enter the room, we will find a touchscreen panel where we can pick from seven short films. Some of these films are silent and others have music and the sound of people talking.

If we want the room to be brighter, or the sound is too low or loud, just ask one of our friendly staff at the front counter to help!

THE SHOP



The shop has things we can buy. It has books, toys, jewellery and homewares. Many of them are made from local artists. If we want to buy something, the staff can help us.

AMENITIES

If we need to use the bathroom, we can find it just before the orange sign that says Imaginarium. The lights for the hallway andbathrooms will turn on automatically when we walk in.

We have two ambulant toilets and an accessible toilet if we need them. The museum is wheelchair friendly. There are also ramps to the front door from the carpark and to the parkland beside the museum.

THINGS TO DO

Some of the fun things we can go to at the museum are:

Exhibition openings: These are when the museum celebrates a new exhibition with morning or afternoon tea, guest speakers and other events depending on what it is about.

Term Time Tots: This program is for children under 5 years of age and their families. Children explore different ideas through fun hands-on art and crafts.

Workshops: There are different workshops organised for adults and children throughout the year.

Talks: The museum likes to invite experts to come to the museum and discuss different topics relevant to the exhibitions.

Group tours: The museum caters for groups to have tours of the museum and the temporary exhibition space.

We can ask the volunteers for more information about any of these events.
