4. AGENDA ITEMS

4.1 Bushfire Economic Recovery

Maree Parker, Deputy Director-General, Regional Economic Development, provided a presentation on the Binna Burra bushfire economic recovery response. Additional information was provided describing the Department of State Development's economic rapid response process.

Frances Bottle and David Licence from the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning (DSDMIP) presented the role and support provided by the Economic Rapid Response Team.

The role of the team is to coordinate a rapid response Workers Transition Scheme in SEQ from Brisbane city to Noosa, such as retrenchments. Three case studies were presented.

Maree Parker presented on disaster recovery at Binna Burra.

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Binna Burra lodge burned down on 8 September 2019 and the lodge was lost completely. The Minister asked for a taskforce to be established which included key players, providers and people who could supply services to the lodge in its recovery and involved all levels of government. DSDMIP got in quickly to establish the first taskforce meeting. At that time the lodge had 63 employees, of which over 40 were reemployed in other roles or support to take on training and other agencies provided employment opportunities.

Taskforce meetings took place on site in Beechmont and a project approach was taken with all agencies at the table. DSDMIP encouraged conversation between the board, a small number of employees and stakeholders to allocate resources and build relationships with the Scenic Rim Council. 49 actions resulted from the taskforce meetings for the early recovery stage.

The lodge was insured for \$16M the year previously, however the insurance company reduced the payout amount to only \$3M the year before due to its location on a small piece of freehold land in the middle of a national park. This necessitated a staged rebuild and forced the board to change its structure after 83 years to a not for profit model. The first stage of rebuild included a focus on getting 3-4 trails open and the camping ground area operational. Money was sourced via crowd sourcing and requests for grants from the federal government. The sky lodges luckily survived due to being built to a higher fire standard.

The biggest issue has been road reconstruction. First fire and then rain has destabilised the roads and delayed reopening by 3-4 months. TMR installed cameras and extra signage and QPS put patrols on which reduced early looting issues which were quickly resolved.

The learnings from Binna Burra is that a whole of government approach is critical to resolve complex issues quickly and the taskforce operated with a sustained high level of cooperation across government and external agencies. High level, support for the taskforce operations and activities from Director-General and Minister was appreciated and enabled the taskforce members to prioritise their responses.

4.2 North Pine Dam Emergency Action Plan

Michel Raymond, Senior Operations Engineer Seqwater, provided an update on recent changes to the North Pine Dam Full Supply Level.

- The North Pine Dam is a high consequence, low probability risk.
- A revised North Pine Dam Emergency Action Plan has been issued.
- The flood manual was revised in 2019 and the Emergency Action Plan was revised 2019. As a result, Seqwater enacted a reduced full supply level in Dec 2019.
- The dam failure risk looks at population at risk in the area likely to be impacted.
- Urban development downstream has increased the population at risk to approximately 30,000 people.
- The potential loss of life is an estimate of potential fatalities due to dam failure. Dam owners
 use Potential Loss of Life in combination with the estimate of dam failure probability to
 measure overall risk.
- In 2012 the overall risk was 600 for day failure and 900 for a night failure. In 2019 this was adjusted to 5,500 for a day failure and 6,200 for a night failure.
- This is higher than other comparable dams in Australia due to the large urban population close to dam and the time between dam failure and time of downstream impact is short - if dam failure occurs many roads will already be flooded.

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- The North Pine Dam could withstand floods up to level 43.3 metres AHD.
- The height revised in 2019 to 41.7 metres AHD but precise level cannot be determined.
- The probability is extremely low at a 1 in 20,000 annual chance.
- Segwater are bringing forward the dam upgrade.
- As a result of the above, the full supply level has been reduced for North Pine Dam. The reduced full supply level is 36 metres AHD and reduces risk to 1 in 80,000 annual chance.
- Revisions to Emergency Action Plan the revised standup emergency action trigger is now set to 40.6 metres AHD and has added a new trigger for standup 'if spillway gates fail to operate properly'.

4.3 **Bushfire Risk Mitigation Plan for the Moreton Region**

Wayne Waltisbuhl, Acting Director Operations, Rural Fire Service Queensland QFES, provided an update on the recent bushfire season and the QFES Bushfire Risk Mitigation Plan for the Moreton Region.

The long fire season commenced in October 2019 and ended on 9 February 2020. It was a busy time - the four weeks in January to February saw 700 people deployed, 100 paid fire fighters sent to the Blue Mountains with 162 volunteers from this region. QFES are now waiting for either a Royal Commission or internal review following the season. Risk mitigation has greater emphasis than previously, and this year will see the largest impact from the media - that Australia wants change in protecting communities to reduce risk coming into fire season. QFES identify high risk communities and decide how to reduce risk which includes hazard reduction, fuel management, protection of assets, community education, maintain protection zones and fire break maintenance.

There are three Area Fire Management Groups in the Brisbane region with one covering the Moreton Bay area and includes key stakeholders such as Parks & Wildlife. There are restrictions with staffing levels, limited budgets and policies need to change. Properties will be incorporated in the Plan, such as Council-owned land, Hancocks plantations, Segwater and DNR. Meetings are chaired by RFS and meet twice per year formally. An interim meeting will be held on 25 March in the Moreton Bay region. All agencies present their hazard reduction plans for the year, matched with high risk areas and solutions for areas not covered. Plans are adjusted accordingly to meet high risk areas.

The bushfire mitigation plan in Moreton Bay region is used to identify hotspots. Planned burns have only a small window of opportunity and anything left over from last year is residual risk and goes to the top of the list for this year. Operation Coolburn is a reporting period from 1 April - 31 August each year to identify the high risk areas and what treatments are required.

The Bushfire Risk Management Plan will be developed next month and will be provided to Council. The document will be live and will continue to grow to prioritise workloads with the outcomes from reviews.

5.3 Australian Red Cross Queensland

Preparedness and Planning

Red Cross are continuing to recruit and train new volunteers. A cohort of 10 new Commanders and 24
new Red Cross Emergency Services Liaison Officers undertook training in early December. Sarah
Bradley is the new Red Cross representative to the Moreton Bay LDMG.

Emergency Communications

When formally activating Red Cross to respond to an emergency, contact should be made via the Red

Response

- Since July 2019, Red Cross teams have responded to more than 20 bushfire events around Australia, supporting people in 110 evacuation/relief centres and recovery/information hubs. Over 52,000 people have been registered through Register.Find.Reunite. More than 2,000 Red Cross people, mostly volunteers, have powered this relief effort.
- · Red Cross teams have been:
 - o supporting people at evacuation and relief centres
 - o registering people's locations so their loved ones can contact them
 - o providing psychological first aid to reduce trauma and distress
 - providing food, water and relief items to people cut off by fires in Victoria
 - o conducting welfare checks on the phone and in person
 - o providing emergency grants to people who have lost homes to bushfires
- Red Cross is providing emergency grants of \$20,000 to people whose homes have been destroyed in the bushfires. These grants are to help people meet immediate needs and are open to people whose primary place of residence has been destroyed or rendered permanently uninhabitable by the bushfires between 1 July 2019 and 28 February 2020.
 - The grants of \$20,000 are per household and are available to all fire affected States and Territories.
 - From 20th January 2020, Red Cross will also contact the families of those deceased to provide an initial \$20,000 bereavement payment to meet their unmet needs during this difficult time, including funeral and related expenses.
 - Additional grants of \$5,000 will be made available to those whose homes need some urgent repairs as a result of bushfire damage.

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- Grant applications are online at: redcross.org.au/grants and will be open until at least 30th April 2020.
- Whilst the initial focus is still very much on meeting urgent and immediate needs, planning for medium
 to long term recovery has commenced. It is acknowledged that for all fire affected communities this will
 be a long, hard struggle. Funding from the current appeal is being channelled in to both the immediate
 response and in to ongoing recovery of these communities.
- <u>Coronavirus</u>: Red Cross have been activated by State Government to support the coronavirus response.
 Activities being undertaken by Red Cross include:
 - Utilising Register.Find.Reunite. to register Australians arriving back in the country and being placed in home or other quarantine for a 14 day period
 - Provision of Psychological first aid welfare checks via phone outreach to those in home quarantine
 - Provision of support at airports as required.
- Update provided at the meeting in relation to the outreach program for those self-isolating during the
 quarantine period. As at meeting date there were 1,000 people in Queensland and 1,500 phone calls
 were made yesterday. There are 17 volunteers available every day. People in quarantine are
 appreciative of the calls.

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

 which provides the Emergency Management Framework to assist with recovery actions.



5.17 Queensland Fire and Emergency Services

Hazard Mitigation and Risk Reduction

 RFS has a key focus on Mitigation and Community education and we are now planning for the Cool burn Operational period. Area Fire Management Groups will be meeting in March 2020 to design and plan all agencies fuel reduction programs and Community Engagement activities. (RFS)

Preparedness and Planning

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- Operation Redux which outlined the Commissioner's intent regarding strategies and objectives for the 2019-20 bushfire season ceased on Friday 31 January 2020. Operation Dovetail is in full effect from Saturday 1 February 2020 and has a mission to minimise the consequences and impacts of the multiple hazard types that are identified as severe weather events.
- Evacuation Centre Management training provided to Community Resilience Volunteers at Dayboro and North Lakes, and Council staff at Strathpine. (EMC)
- Participated in the Moreton Aged Care Disaster Forum. (EMC)
- Fire bans for the MBRC area commenced on Wednesday 4 September and were extended continuously through to 30 December 2019.
- A State of Fire Emergency for Queensland was declared from 9 November 2019. This was partially lifted and didn't apply to MBRC area from 20 November 2019. The Declaration was fully revoked across all of Queensland from 23 November 2019.
- QFES is currently preparing for any escalation that might occur from the Novel Coronavirus.
 - A Standing Order has been developed and distributed to all operational staff for procedures to cover exposure to the virus.
 - The SOC is developing a statewide Coronavirus plan.
 - A QFES liaison officer is deployed to the SHECC and further QFES officers were deployed to the Brisbane airport to assist enact the QFES Brisbane Region Reception Plan.

Response

- A total of 520 landscape fire incidents have occurred this bushfire season within the MBRC area between 1 September 2019 and 5 February 2020.
- A total of 609 individual staff from Brisbane Region have deployed outside of the Region (to other Regions and Interstate) to provide assistance for the fires between 1 September 2019 and 6 February 2020. Of that 175 were RFS volunteers.
- RFS in Brisbane Region have just completed a very long and busy bushfire season commencing locally in July 2019 and finishing on 24 December. (RFS)
- Significant fires during this period were: Jimna, Monsildale, Jimna North, Dundas, Ningi. (RFS)

Relief and Recovery

RFS has 49 appliances interstate of which 6 are from Brisbane Region. These appliances will be recommissioned over the next 2 weeks.

General Business

- The latest version of the Queensland Disaster Management Training Framework has been released.
- A Training Needs Analysis is currently being undertaken to assess the amended training liabilities of DDMG and LDMG members. (EMC)
- Update provided at the meeting acknowledged and thanked Council during the bushfires for their assistance.
- Disaster Management Planning training sessions will be held on 6 May 2020, organised by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority.
- More information will be provided closer to the event date. Sessions are not compulsory but is good to attend.

5.18 **Queensland Health**

In the 17 days since 2 February 2020 approximately 2,700 passengers have been tested.

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- During the peak, while flights were still operating from China, up to 500 passengers were tested per day.
 This has been scaled down to 20 to 25 tests per day.
- As of today, there are no confirmed cases of coronavirus in Metro North, however 127 people have been screened in Metro North since 2 February with negative results for the virus. There has been an increase in presentations at Emergency Departments.
- The Australian Red Cross and QPS are providing follow ups on self-isolation cases. Any non-compliance is notified to the Health Department and then followed up.
- There have been 17 non-compliance notifications received so far and those people have been reminded
 of their obligations.
- The Health Department can issue detention orders under the Public Health Act, but this has not been necessary so far.

- In the current rain event (2nd to 11th February 2020) the unit responded to 89 tasks with more forecast with impending weather event.
