Protect what matters most

How to plan, prepare and survive during bushfire and severe weather season

Heavy rains, floods and bushfires can strike with little warning. Taking simple steps now can help keep your family safe, reduce damage to your home and make recovery easier.

Here's how to get prepared this season:

- Know your risk: Use City of Moreton Bay's Flood Check Property Reports to check your property's flood risk
- Make a plan: Create a household emergency plan
- Pack an emergency kit: Include essentials to stay safe and self-sufficient for at least three days

- Prepare your home: Clear gutters, trim trees, check your roof and secure loose items
- Stay informed:
 - Bookmark Council's Disaster
 Dashboard for real-time updates,
 road closures, weather alerts and more at disaster.moretonbay.qld.gov.au
 - Refer to the Bureau of Meteorology for weather updates and warnings
 - Register to MoretonAlert for notifications on severe weather, bushfires, Council's planned burns and potential flash flooding.

Curious about how City of Moreton Bay is balancing growth with green space?

We're committed to preserving 75% of our city as green space – because protecting our environment is just as important as planning for our future. Here's a clear, simple breakdown of what this means, why it matters, and how Council is working to keep Moreton Bay beautiful and sustainable for generations to come.

Preserving Our Green Spaces, Going Green As We Grow: Moreton Bay's Commitment to a Sustainable Future

At City of Moreton Bay, we are proud to uphold our commitment to preserving 75% of our beautiful city as green space, a vital promise that supports our community's wellbeing, environmental health, and the natural character we all cherish. I understand many of you have questions about what this 75% means, how it's defined, and how Council uses this figure in planning for our future. So I want to be transparent and clear about our intentions and how this benefits you, our residents.

What is included in the 75% green space figure?

This figure comes from the South East Queensland Regional Plan 2023 (ShapingSEQ), a State Government-led vision guiding sustainable growth across our city. ShapingSEQ divides land into three broad categories:

- Urban Footprint: Areas planned to accommodate growth and new development until 2046
- Regional Landscape and Rural Production Area
- Rural Living Area

Our 75% green space refers to all land *outside* the Urban Footprint – which means land designated as Regional Landscape and Rural Production Area, and Rural Living Area. These areas encompass:

- · Rural landscapes and agricultural land
- · Conservation zones and natural habitats
- Recreational areas for community enjoyment
- Rural living zones that maintain our city's unique character

This ensures that while our city grows, we actively protect the environment, rural lifestyles, and open spaces that make Moreton Bay so special.

How does Council use this 75% figure?

This commitment is a

cornerstone of our Growth Management Strategy 2042 (GMS) – a strategic roadmap endorsed by Council to guide responsible growth over the coming decades. The GMS aligns with ShapingSEQ and provides clear direction on how Moreton Bay will grow sustainably, balancing new housing and infrastructure needs while preserving our natural and rural landscapes.

Though the GMS itself is not a statutory document, it influences our planning schemes, infrastructure priorities, and advocacy efforts with the State Government.

Importantly, it sets a target to keep 75% of our city free from urban development, ensuring:

- Protection of our environment and biodiversity
- Preservation of our rural and recreational spaces
- A sustainable settlement pattern that prevents unchecked urban sprawl

Why does this matter to you?

By prioritising green space preservation, Council is working to:

- Maintain the natural beauty and liveability of Moreton Bay
- Support healthier lifestyles with accessible parks and natural areas
- Protect farmland and rural businesses essential to our economy
- Safeguard wildlife habitats and biodiversity for future generations

We want you to feel confident that as our city evolves, so does our respect for the environment and community values that define us.

Morayfield NHP

Council has recently endorsed the Morayfield Neighbourhood Planning Project Future Directions Report (the Report) following the most recent round of community consultation. During the consultation period, 122 people responded via the quick poll, and 69 submissions were made (including a petition signed by 20 residents). We also spoke to over 100 people across three pop-up events at Morayfield Shopping Centre. Thanks to everyone who shared their view with us.

City of Moreton Bay is committed to sustainably managing growth and preserving 75% of the city as rural and natural landscapes, free from urban development. By increasing the supply and diversity of housing in well-serviced neighbourhoods like Morayfield, we can meet the population and housing objectives outlined by the State Government in ShapingSEQ. The Report supports these goals by offering a clear plan for growth that promotes more housing options near existing infrastructure and services like shops, cafes, schools, and parks. We all know the reality of the cost-of-living crisis is seeing many being priced out of suburbs they grew up in. By allowing greater diversity of housing types and sizes, families, workers, and downsizers will have more options.

Priority Development Area declared over land at Burpengary East

The State Government has officially declared a Priority Development Area (PDA) over land at Burpengary East, marking a significant milestone for the \$2.74 billion North Harbour Marina project. This development aims to transform the city with an operational marina, marina industry facilities, a marina village, and a mix of residential housing options.

Planning for the PDA is being led by Economic Development Queensland (EDQ) in partnership with City of Moreton Bay, landholders, and the local community. The project is set to deliver approximately 3,700 new homes, including an early release of 200 homes to address the urgent housing demand in the area.

The development is expected to create nearly 2,000 new jobs through its dedicated maritime industry infrastructure, tourism, hotel precincts, and retail offerings, contributing an estimated \$456 million annually to the city's economy. This growth is seen as essential to support the expanding population of Moreton Bay, which continues to attract hundreds of new residents each week.

City of Moreton Bay has expressed strong support for the PDA, emphasising its role in fostering economic prosperity and community wellbeing. As the project progresses, collaboration between government, developers and the community remains a priority to ensure sustainable and inclusive growth in our city.
