





How is stormwater managed in new developments?

This is called vulnerable to flooding.

In the past, flood modeling was not as refined, which created a lack of accurate information on flood risks.

The development of flood models has improved steadily over the last few decades, but there will come a point where the accuracy and precision of these models will be difficult to improve further. The devastating rainfall events in February 2022 provided a rare opportunity to test and review flood modeling in a real-world scenario, and served as an opportunity to ground truth and peer review the existing models. This event allowed for a better understanding of the accuracy of current flood modeling, as it was the largest rainfall event in 130 years.

Council has taken steps to manage flood risk in existing developed areas, including the development of a floodplain risk management framework. Moreover, in 2016, the council integrated flood risk into its Planning Scheme, containing a flood hazard overlay and a coastal hazard overlay to identify areas at risk of flood hazards and coastal hazards. Any proposed development within the mapped extent of these overlays must demonstrate compliance with their requirements to minimise flood risks and prevent additional impacts.

Council also provides Flood Check Development Reports for those proposing new building and development works to understand the floodrelated requirements of the Planning Scheme.

New developments under the 2016 MBRC scheme must demonstrate greater than 1% AEP (1 in 100) flood immunity as part of any approvals, and cannot use fill to achieve this.

While historical decisions cannot be changed, the state, federal and local governments have worked collectively to right historical 'wrongs' where possible. The opportunity exists for residents to do a free flood check before purchasing a property, which is important given the limitations of the flood hazard mapping in the planning scheme. There is also provision for developers to vary flood hazard overlays if they believe the data is incorrect or out of date.

The effort to incorporate up-to-date flood data and advance flood modeling is essential to mitigating the risks associated with flood-prone areas. By acknowledging historical decisions and integrating more precise data into planning schemes, local governments can better understand and manage flood risk. The availability of free flood check reports and the opportunity for developers to challenge flood hazard overlays reflects a commitment to improving flood risk management and ensuring the safety of residents in flood-prone areas.

However, without our region. We do this by slowing down water stormwater attenuation.



The effects of stormwater runoff

On undeveloped land, the rain will mostly soak into the ground or flow through the soil into streams. As buildings are developed, there are more hard surfaces, meaning the rain can no longer soak into the ground.

What is a stormwater attenuation area?

A stormwater attenuation area is land near a river or stream that is allowed to flood. These are often called detention basins. This helps control future floods and may also create a 'wetland habitat' for local animals.

Managing natural and developed site water flow.

To balance natural water flow in developed areas, engineers create systems that store water during rain and storm events. Tools like detention basins are used. These basins are designed to help slow down the release of water into local waterways, helping to prevent flooding.

How are these basins designed?

Engineers use computer modelling when new buildings or land are developed. This allows them to check how the detention basins and pipes will respond to various rain conditions. By doing this, they can see if peak stormwater flows exiting the development site match natural runoff stormwater flow rates. These scenarios include common events as well as requirements. When do new developments need to have stormwater attenuation?

There are many state and local government policies covering the management of stormwater runoff on new development sites. The policies state that every new large development site in Queensland must have an attenuation strategy in place. All stormwater systems in Queensland are designed by experienced and registered stormwater engineers.

When new developments are built, the developers and engineers are required to design detention basins that capture and slowly release the water flow to limit the impacts of development. This helps keep creeks and rivers from getting too much extra water all at once.

Do more rooftops equal more water?

Building new developments, the increase in roofs and roads means rainwater can rush quickly to other places. This leads to increased runoff because there are less grassy areas to soak up excess rainwater

Does this mean more water will be directed to our creeks and rivers?

If stormwater isn't managed properly, the increase in water to creeks and waterways means they could suffer. Because of this, every new development has the responsibility to protect the local waterways. They do this by making sure that the area handles water in a wav that is similar to predevelopment conditions.

To what level or flood event do new Developments need to be constructed?

The level and rainfall intensity event assessed for each development varies. It depends on the vulnerability of the land use, the potential damage to property and the safety of road users. As a minimum all areas of new development must be outside of the 1 in 100year flood extent, as defined in Council's planning scheme.

Stormwater detention systems must capture all runoff from new development sites up to and including the 1 in 100-year flood event.

Roads are part of the stormwater conveyance system in large rainfall events and are designed to be relatively flood free in smaller more frequent rainfall event.

How do I check if my property is affected by flooding?

Council offers Flood Check Reports for those planning to build in the area. These reports tell you if your property is in a flood or coastal

hazard area and provides the information you need to meet Council's Planning Scheme Flood Check Reports.

In our first full year as a city, 2024 will see Council continue to focus on the needs of our communities first, including advocating for our fair share of funding especially for infrastructure, while also conserving our distinctive lifestyle and wildlife corridors, against the backdrop of population growth.

Realising our priority of 'going green as we grow', Council will roll out the first phase of a dedicated food organics and garden organics (FOGO) waste kerbside collection service from late 2024. Phase one will see the introduction of a garden organics collection service (GO) where lime green lidded bins will be distributed. Once processing facilities have been secured, waste collection will transition to a complete FOGO service. FOGO will increase our city's recycling rate, reduce landfill and see resources produced from recovered materials.

Another significant step forward is the allocation of council-owned land at Dakabin for the construction of a dedicated wildlife hospital. Currently, a gap in the SEQ wildlife hospital network means injured wildlife rescuers travel up to two hours for animal care. We're urgently seeking financial support from state and federal governments to bring this vital facility to fruition.

This commitment to balance growth extends to housing and homelessness challenges. The Housing and Homelessness Action Plan (HHAP) outlines key activities addressing affordability and homelessness over the next five years. We're offering council-owned land in Morayfield and Caboolture for potential social, affordable or crisis housing developments, guided by changes in our Community Leasing Policy.

We're also continuing the Attraction of Affordable Social Housing Development Policy, waiving fees for developers. Already, this initiative has helped people experiencing homelessness secure accommodation at Bric Housing's recently completed 18-dwelling accommodation block at Redcliffe with more to be realised this year.

And we're taking the cost-of-living pressure off families with Council's extensive calendar of free events from movie nights to Lunar New Year celebrations.

Council looks forward to continuing to support our communities, protect and enhance our natural spaces, and maintain sustainable lifestyles this year as we work together to bring our living city vision to life.
