Creating a resilient city

Resilience starts with the community and once again City of Moreton Bay banded together to show its spirit in the face of a potential natural disaster.

While Tropical Cyclone Alfred didn't quite hit with the gusto that was initially forecast, we still received over 300 requests for fallen trees, there were 62,000 properties affected by power outages, over 120 roads were flooded, and 1,800 tasks were recorded with the Moreton Bay SES Unit.

It took a major effort from residents, emergency responders and Council staff working together to get the city ready to face the cyclone and then back on its feet as soon as possible.

Our Local Disaster Coordination Centre worked day and night to manage the preparation and response, while providing key information to the public and emergency services. Part of that included the distribution of over 3,000 tonnes of sand and over 300,000 sandbags in three days,

which is three times the amount we had ever gone through for a single weather event. We applaud everyone for their preparation, patience and understanding through such a stressful time.

Our City Flood Database and flood mapping was updated in late February, and was critical to accurately predict potential flooding around the city and send real-time messages through our MoretonAlert system.

Look out for our 'Know Your Risk' campaign, so you can understand your risk to floods, and update your emergency plans to prepare for the next flood event.

We'll be rolling out a number of projects and initiatives, all outlined in our Environment and Sustainability Strategy, over the coming years to continually build on our city's resilience to all natural hazards.







THE LIVING CITY UPDATE With Mayor Peter Flannery

It's in times of disaster that you really understand just how resilient and supportive our community is. Tropical Cyclone Alfred tested us, but our community spirit shone through. Thank you to all of you, our residents, who worked alongside our emergency responders and the Council team to ready the city for the cyclone, and then again in the aftermath.

It was timely that our City Flood
Database and flood mapping
had only recently been updated,
ensuring a more accurate response
to potential flooding risk. This new
flood mapping also means residents
themselves can more easily access,
and better understand, their own
flood risk. Be sure to download your
Flood Check Property Report and
familiarise yourself with the Moreton
Bay Flood Viewer.

We're also continuing to advocate to other levels of government for funding to support our city's growth, liveability, sustainability and resilience. As part of this, we're seeking \$30 million to build a new Local Disaster Coordination Centre in Petrie, which will better support first responders and communication during emergencies. Know your flood risk

New flood mapping is now available, using updated data and technology for greater accuracy. Some areas now show higher or lower risk. Check your Flood Check Property Report and explore the Moreton Bay Flood Viewer to understand your risk.

GO like a PRO!

Residential properties with a land size smaller than 300 or larger than 2,000 square metres can now apply to opt in to the GO service. Additional GO bins can also be requested. Remember, only garden organics material is accepted in your GO bin. Please ensure no contamination of any kind is disposed into your bin. For more info or to apply visit moretonbay.qld.gov.au/GO

Hints to keep your bin as fresh as possible

- Line your bin with leaves or sticks first and add lawn clippings last.
- Put your bin out for collection every fortnight. This reduces odour!
- Mow your lawn as close to bin collection day as possible.

We are enhancing liveability with a number of projects underway, but I also wanted to share the good news that we've secured \$13.6 million of funding across Moreton Bay through the Queensland Government's South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

This includes:

- Hornibrook Esplanade Cycleway
 Stage 2a, Clontarf: \$1.3 million
 toward the total cost of
 \$1.8 million
- Langdon Park Sports Field
 Lighting Renewal, Margate:
 \$650,000
- Margate Beach Park Amenities
 Upgrade: \$650,000
- Redcliffe Wayfinding Signage: \$350,000.

The Hornibrook Esplanade
Cycleway Stage 2a is a fantastic
win for Clontarf, creating a safer,
more accessible space for cyclists
and pedestrians. This investment
strengthens our focus on active
transport and healthier,
connected communities.

These projects support local recreation and tourism while creating well-equipped spaces for residents and visitors alike.

Local projects

Duffield Road, Margate - repair of road pavement, maintenance of existing drainage infrastructure and approximately 458 metres of road resurfacing works along Duffield Road and Ernest Street, Margate.

Maine Road, Clontarf - repair of road pavement, maintenance of existing drainage infrastructure and approximately 378 metres of road resurfacing works along Maine Road, Clontarf from Duffield Road to Beedham Street.

Silvyn Street, Redcliffe -

construction of a concrete pathway on both the eastern and western side of Silvyn Street.

Seawall Renewal - Charlish Park South, Redcliffe - removal and replacement of existing seawall. Improvements to the shared pedestrian and cycle path.

Ella Street, Redcliffe -

construction of a concrete pathway on the northern side of the street from Oxley Avenue to Sutton Street.

Anzac Avenue, Redcliffe -

footpath renewal along the southern side of Anzac Avenue between Percy Street and Livermore Street. The project will involve removal of the existing 1.2m wide concrete footpath and replacing with a 1.5m wide concrete footpath over approximately 195m. Additional works include renewal of five kerb ramps to facilitate pedestrians crossing at McAneny Street, Tilley Street and Percy Street and reconfiguration of existing traffic refuge islands.

Easier way to recycle

City of Moreton Bay is leading the way with Queensland's largest 'pilot' installation of a new bin innovation.

In partnership with Container Exchange, the not-forprofit that runs Containers for Change, 64 Container Exchange Points have been retrofitted to bins across public spaces in Moreton Bay.

The new collection points, are a safe and efficient resource for community members to dispose of and collect empty drink containers.

Users are encouraged to place empty glasses, plastic bottles and aluminium drink cans into the designated slots, instead of littering or putting them in a landfill bin.

This allows for users to collect empty bottles from the stations in a safe way and collect the 10-cent refund at one of Moreton Bay's Container Return Points.

These stations are a great opportunity for you to make a difference and keep bottles out of landfill.
